

### **Churchwardens Report**

#### 2023 - a year of changes.

Our 9.00 Sunday service is well supported by those who like to receive Holy Communion regularly and also by those who appreciate being able to worship at an earlier time if they have a busy day ahead of them. Thank you to those who preside at Holy Communion and lead and preach at our services and to our instrumentalists and singers - music makes such a difference. Being able to mix and mingle over coffee between our services is an added bonus.

The numbers at the 10.30 service remain stable and while Cafe Church is not for everyone, those who attend clearly appreciate it. The Kids and Families Services have been interesting and fun and the teas have been a big success but sadly numbers have remained low. Our Sunday morning children's group is a cause for concern. Tim, our Youth and Children's Worker, moved on to his new post in the summer and then we lost four more leaders over the autumn term. By the end of 2023 we were only able to offer one group on a Sunday morning. We miss Tim in all sorts of ways but we are grateful for all he achieved whilst he was here. He leaves a legacy of excellent paperwork and Youth Cafe 1 and 2.

Andrew's departure was sudden and unexpected. We thank Andrew and Cathy for their years of faithful service, their willingness to innovate and their unfailing good humour. They have been warmly welcomed at their new church and are enjoying the challenges of getting to know a new place and people.

Please take some time to pray and consider what time and talents you can offer to support the various ministries at Trinity now that we are in vacancy.

### Churches Together in Southwell

Churches Together in Southwell is evolving. Last autumn, Frank McKenzie, Co-ordinator of CTS, announced to the CTS Forum that he plans to move to Sheffield, and I announced that I was relinquishing my roles within CTS after 13 years. Members of the forum were very keen that CTS continue; both the regular activities and the capacity to instigate responses and initiatives as required. In order for this to happen, folk needed to step forward to take on the various roles.

Whilst the formation of a small co-ordinating team is ongoing, other roles have been taken up by various people, as follows:

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity – Eddie Adams, of Southwell Methodist Church, arranged for 6 of the churches to host lunchtime sessions of prayer and reflection, followed by soup & roll. These were well attended by up to 30 people at each.

**Southwell Supporting Newark Foodbank** – Karen Edginton, of Southwell Minster, organizes an annual rota of volunteers who collect donations from shops and churches each week and take them to Newark.

**Season of Creation service** – Usually held in September, a small group organizes this each year.

**Christmas Card** (Delivered with The Bramley) – Sue Hartley, of Southwell Baptist Church, will design and produce this from December 2024.

**CTS Welcome Scheme** – The scheme endeavours to give a welcome gift, on behalf of CTS and the Town Council, to new residents of Southwell. The group who organizes this comprises Peter Harris, Marian Welham, Marjorie Hustwayte, all of Holy Trinity Church, and Wendy Adcock, of Riverside Church.

CTS Website – Barry Westbury, of Southwell Baptist Church, has taken over maintenance and updating.

**CTS Forum planning** – Trisch Thornton, of Southwell Baptist Church, now arranges forums and agendas. These will now take place every 2 months, with each of the 6 larger churches hosting one annually.

**Email communications** – Carolyn James, of Holy Trinity Church, has taken on the task of maintaining email groups and contacting them as necessary.

**CTS Treasurer** – A new treasurer was appointed on 4<sup>th</sup> March. He is Laurence Cunnington, and the new counter-signatories are Patrick Sills and Wendy Adcock.

### **Deanery Synod**

The Newark and Southwell Deanery Synod met three times during 2023, 15<sup>th</sup> March, 13<sup>th</sup> July and 17<sup>th</sup> October. I am also a member of the Deanery Standing Committee that meets between these times. Please get in touch if there are any issues that you would like to discuss.

#### **Meetings**

The meetings during 2023 gave opportunities to gather, support each other and share about the good news happening in the churches. There were discussions on Parish Share, times to pray for each other, updates on the vacancies in the Deanery, Diocesan Synod and General Synod. Living in Love and Faith was a major item on the agenda at General Synod and this filtered down to the Deanery Synod throughout the year. Parish Share was calculated differently for 2024, following a review by the Diocese, acknowledging it is a huge struggle to give when costs are going up. The Deanery is thankful for the contribution you make during the year.

#### **Meetings**

In March we invited James Halstead, the Principal of School of Discipleship to share with us the Lay Ministry Framework. At the July meeting a new Deanery Synod Triennium commenced with Elections for Standing Committee & Lay Chair. Michael Wilson took the chair again, informing us, it would be his last Triennium. Archdeacon Tors joined us and shared the Vision Refresh Update. Some of our Churchwardens joined us before the start of the Synod and the Archdeacon held a short Admission service. At the October meeting we welcomed James as the New Area Dean and Zoe Ball from 100Homes shared with us the ways we can support foster carers and children in care.

#### **Clergy Chapter**

John Chambers stepped down as Area Dean in March and James Halstead was appointed Interim Area Dean for Newark and Southwell in September, Phil White of the West Trent Benefice retired in May, Georgie Hadley of the Riverside Parishes retired in August and Andrew (Porter) moved to the Benefice in Mansfield Woodhouse in October. Their service to our deanery was warmly recognised. We welcomed Danny Marshall to the Deanery. Danny serves his curacy with Revd Chris Lion at St Mary Magdalene and St Leonard's in Newark.

## Safeguarding

### **Toddlers**

What have been the highlights of the past year?

Firstly we continue to celebrate our fantastic Toddler team who come week by week to support Toddler families. They work really hard and we receive many lovely verbal and written messages about our service. We continue to feel privileged to do what we do. We now average about 35/40 plus families each week including up to eight Dads/Grandads.

At the end of each term we have special events: Teddy Bear picnic in July, Easter Eggs and Hot cross buns in March/April and our fantastic Nativity (we always have a good angelic host) and Christmas party with scrumptious food, Christmas soft play and a very important visitor who brings gifts!!!!

#### New initiatives :-

We have reinvented our display table with Christian literature as well as community notices, we hope that some folk will take advantage of the free information. We read Christian stories that connect to the craft activities and they are well received. We are beginning to incorporate Christian songs into singing time.

To continue to encourage parents/grandparents/carers to come to church social events, quiz nights and Kids and Family services. We are always looking for ways to engage in conversations and deepen our relationships with our families.

To be thinking of new and exciting things to do although we are restricted by lack of accessible storage space.

## **Youth Ministry**

Youth cafe 1 is thriving and we have been blessed with the help of several new leaders so the commitment required can be shared evenly and is not too demanding in terms of time. Youth cafe 2 varies in attendance between 2 and 13 depending on other commitments. Again new leaders have come forward and are working really well. The main highlight of last year was that we managed to continue with youth cafe 2 and we now include a short Christian interactive session each week.

For the coming years we have several aims:

- to welcome young people moving up from youth cafe 1 into youth cafe 2 this September. We hope that this new cohort will remain engaged with Holy Trinity.
- to explore engaging with young people in the local schools.
- to explore ways of engaging local people in our services.
